Example: New Zealand Body Armour

As the Superpower United States sets the de-facto standards, but ...

- Unwieldy and convoluted bureaucratic process
- Restrictions cross nation interactions between natural allies (not including the US)

Example: ANZAC Frigate Pool Sharing

Leading to

- Drive to procure elsewhere ...
- Proliferation of equipment in theatre...
- Driving multiple logistic chains...
- Lack of integration...
- Lack of interoperability...
- Less effectiveness.

But the real cost ...

- Overhead hinders participation in the "long war"...
- Drives up the risk resulting in more casualties...
- Potential coalition partners "opting out"
