

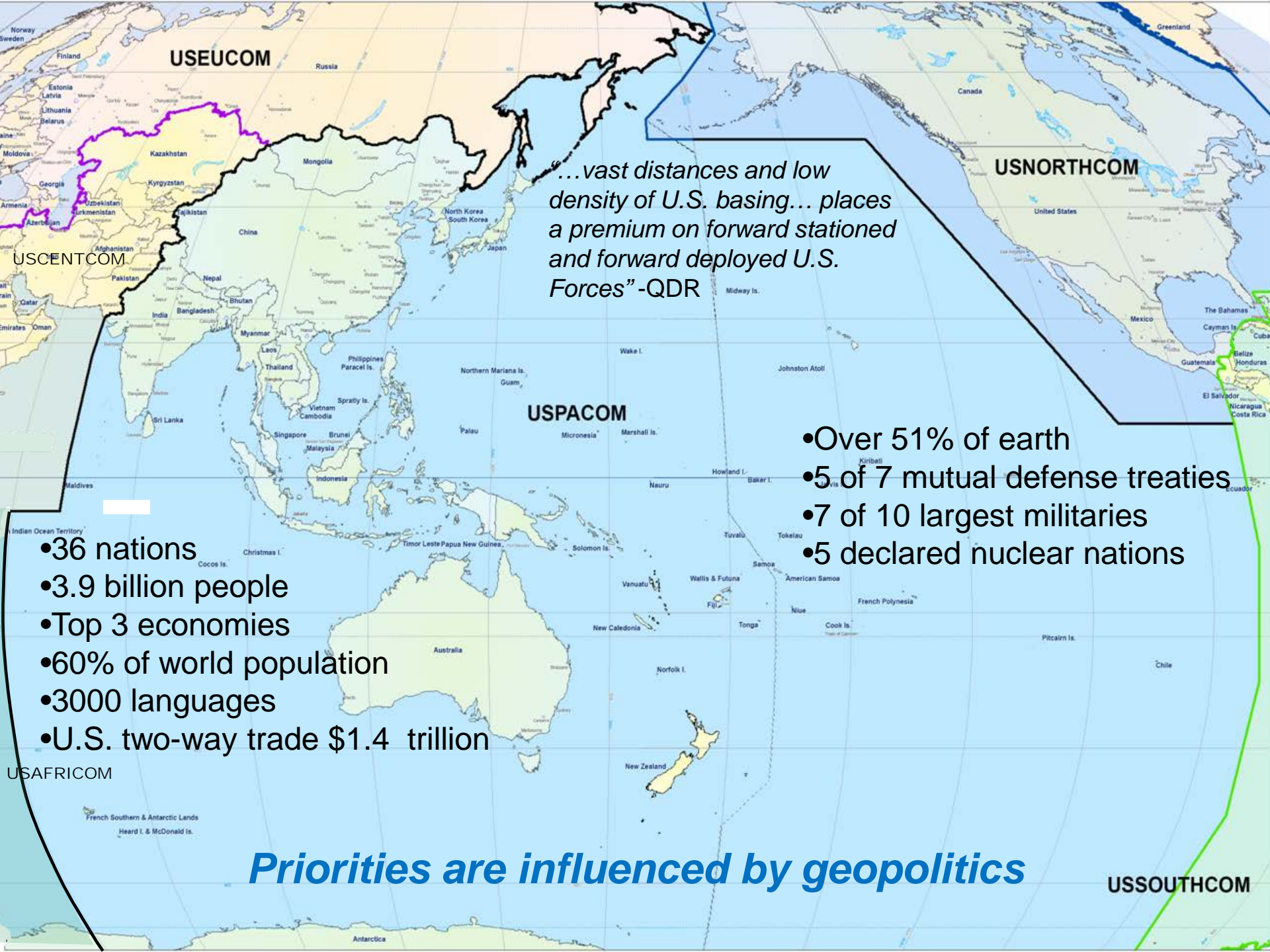

- Build international defense partnerships

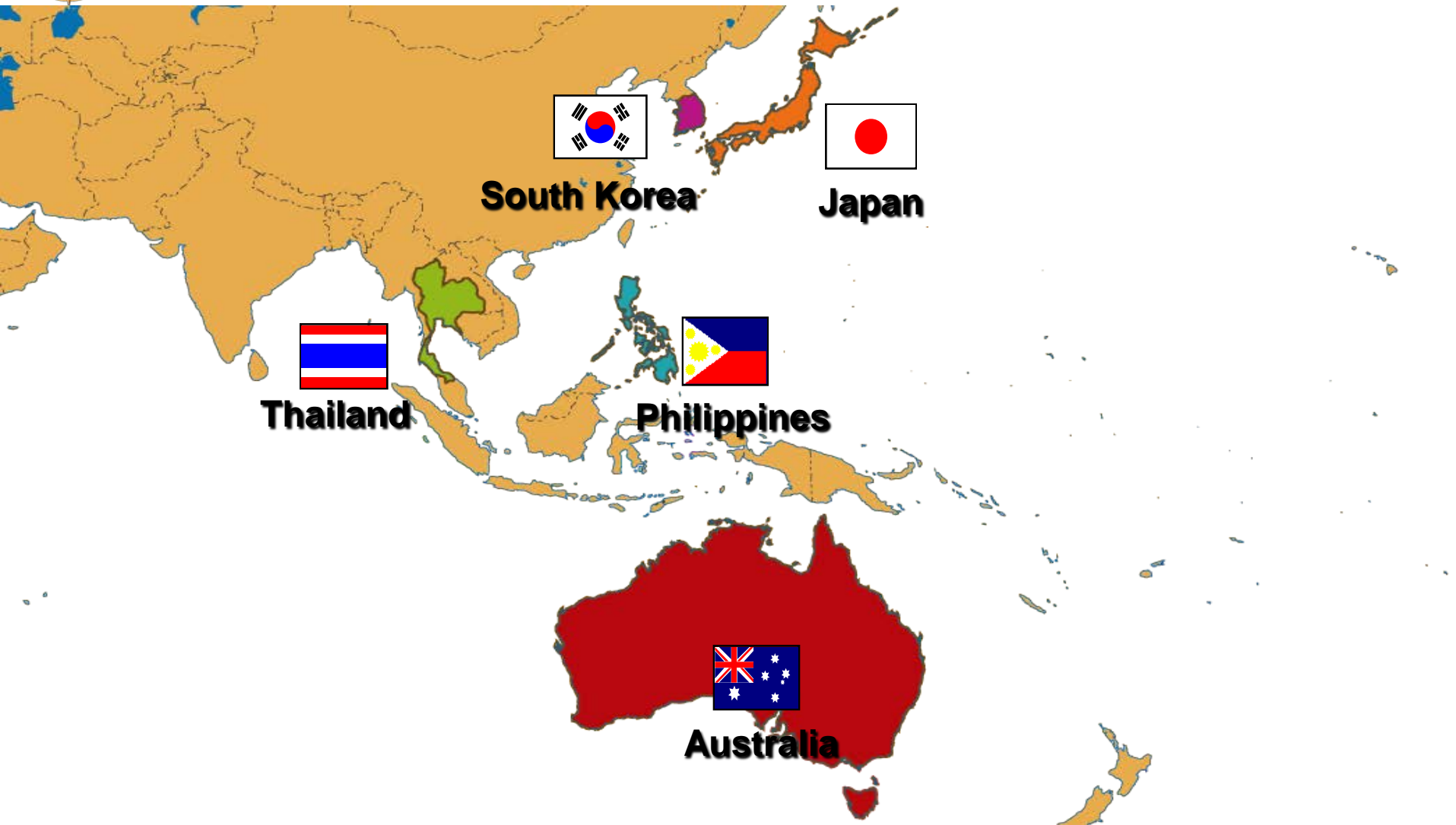
S&T Regional Partner Cooperation Strategy

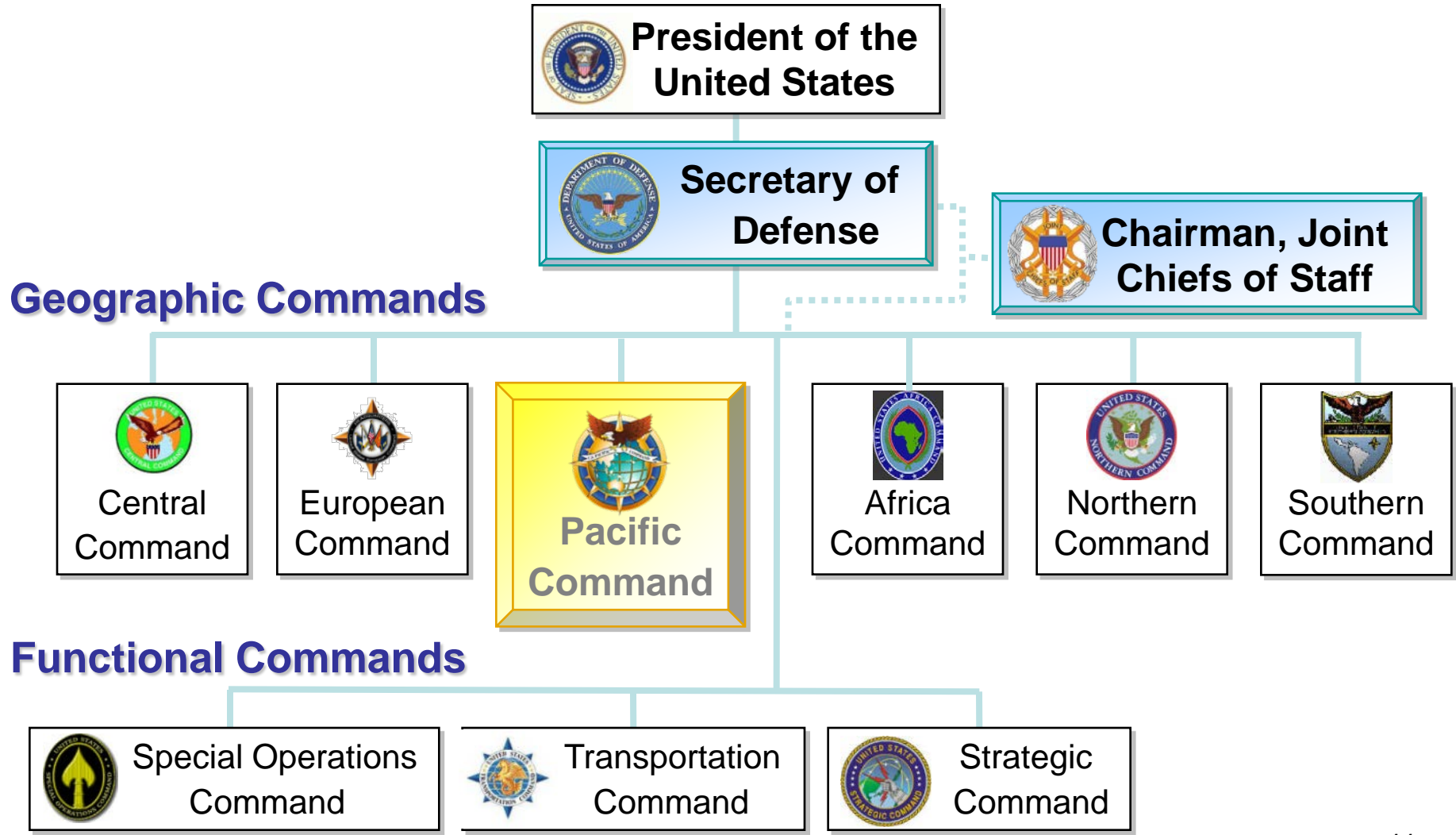
