1:30 pm OPTIMIZING AMERICA'S DEFENSE SUSTAINMENT CAPABILITIES

The United States' military is arguably the most powerful and technologically advanced military force in the world, but is also the most expensive. The acquisition cost of weapon systems continues to climb due to market forces and, with the life cycle cost of sustainment estimated to be three to four times the cost of the hardware, it is hard to see how we can continue to support the force without breaking the budget. The good news is that we have a defense industrial base robust enough to solve this challenge, if government and industry can trust one another enough to work together. Both sides have obvious advantages they can bring to the table, and it would not take much to achieve a workable solution that plays to the strengths of each. Working together, we can reach the ideal end state that combines the strengths of both parties to achieve an affordable sustainment solution that meets the needs of both government AND industry. This panel will explore ideas that address the achievement of affordable and effective depot level sustainment solutions.
