BIOGRAPHIES



ADM CHRISTOPHER GRADY, USN

Vice Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff U.S. Department of Defense

ADM Christopher W. Grady of Newport, RI, a graduate of the University of Notre

Dame, received his commission through the Naval Reserve Officers Training Corps program. He is a distinguished graduate of Georgetown University, where he earned a Master of Arts in National Security Studies while concurrently participating as a fellow in Foreign Service at the Edmund A. Walsh School of Foreign Service. He is also a distinguished graduate of the National War College earning a Master's of Science in National Security Affairs.

A career surface warfare officer, Grady served aboard USS Moosbrugger (DD 980) and USS Princeton (CG 59). He then commanded USS Chief (MCM 14), as rotational Crew Echo, and deployed in command of USS Ardent (MCM 12), in Operation Desert Fox. He also commanded USS Cole (DDG 67), where he deployed as part of NATO's Standing Naval Forces Mediterranean; Destroyer Squadron, where he deployed to the Arabian Gulf as sea combat commander for the Theodore Roosevelt Carrier Strike Group in support of Operations Enduring Freedom and Iraqi Freedom; and Carrier Strike Group (CSG) 1/Carl Vinson Carrier Strike Group, where he deployed for nearly 10 months to the Western Pacific and the Arabian Gulf conducting combat operations in support of Operation Inherent Resolve.

Ashore, Grady served on the Joint Chiefs of Staff and then as naval aide to the Chief of Naval Operations; as the assistant branch head, Europe and Eurasia Politico-Military Affairs Branch (OPNAV N524); as executive assistant to the Navy's Chief of Legislative Affairs; as the deputy executive secretary of the National Security Council in the White House, and as Executive Assistant to the Chief of Naval Operations.

As a flag officer, he served as director of the Maritime Operations Center (N2/3/5/7), Commander, U.S. Pacific Fleet; Commander, Naval Surface Force Atlantic; Commander, U.S. 6th Fleet/Commander, Naval Striking and Support Forces NATO/Deputy Commander, U.S. Naval Forces Europe and U.S. Naval Forces Africa. He most recently served as commander, U.S. Fleet Forces Command, and as Commander Naval Forces U.S. Northern Command, Commander Naval Forces U.S. Strategic Command. and as Commander Task Force Atlantic in coordination with U.S. Naval Forces Europe.

Grady serves as the 12th Vice Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. In this capacity, he is a member of the Joint Chiefs of Staff and the Nation's second highest-ranking military officer.



THE HON. KATHLEEN MILLER, SES

Deputy Under Secretary of Defense, Comptroller, Office of the Under Secretary of Defense U.S. Department of Defense

The Honorable Kathleen S. Miller was sworn in as Deputy Under Secretary of

Defense (Comptroller) on August 11, 2021.

Prior to joining the Office of the Comptroller, Miller served as Administrative Assistant to the Secretary of the Army. Starting in 2018, Ms. Miller was the Senior Career Civilian in the Army and was the principal career civilian adviser to the Secretary of the Army for administrative and business matters, including transformational activities in the Headquarters and with the Civilian Workforce. She oversaw the operation of a field operating agency and a headquarters element comprising of more than 600

civilian and military employees who execute 66 functions for customers in the Army, Department of Defense, and other Federal agencies across geographically dispersed CONUS and OCONUS operating locations.

From 2016 to 2018, Miller served as the Assistant Deputy Chief of Staff (DCS), G-3/5/7. As the civilian deputy to the DCS, G-3/5/7, she provided oversight and guidance to the Strategy, Plans, and Policy; Administration and Resources; Cyber Operations; and Command and Control Support Agency Directorates. Her focus included planning, programming, budgeting, and execution of the DCS, G-3/5/7's program and budget, manpower, contracts, information technology, facilities

and administration, cyber activities, special access programs, sensitive activities programs, and support to agencies outside the Army. She was also responsible for the DCS, G-3/5/7 civilian management and was actively engaged in Army mentoring and development of the force..

Miller also served six years at the Principal Assistant Deputy Chief of Staff, Army G4, where she oversaw implementation of logistics IT systems. She has held several executive positions in the Army Budget Office, including Acting Director of the Army Budget.

Miller was selected to the Senior Executive Service in the Department of Treasury in 2002.





THE HON. DAVID L. NORQUIST

President & CEO
National Defense Industrial Association

The Hon. David L. Norquist is President and Chief Executive Officer of the National

Defense Industrial Association (NDIA). He joined NDIA on May 1, 2022 bringing with him more than 30 years of public and private sector experience in national security and federal financial management.

Norquist previously served as the 34th Deputy Secretary of Defense from 2019 to 2021 and was responsible for the day-to-day operations of the Department of Defense (DoD), including managing the Pentagon's budget and personnel. He led reforms in DoD business processes and realigned investments toward the challenges of multidomain warfare. At the request of the Biden Administration, Norquist served as Acting Secretary of Defense and continued as

Deputy Secretary until the Senate confirmed Secretary Lloyd Austin and Deputy Secretary Kathleen Hicks.

From 2017 until 2019 as the Under Secretary of Defense (Comptroller) and Chief Financial Officer, he supported the National Defense Strategy (NDS) through the development and execution of the DoD's annual budget of more than \$680 billion. Norquist strengthened accountability to the taxpayer by implementing DoD's first department-wide financial statement audit.

Norquist began his career in 1989 as a Presidential Management Fellow supporting Army intelligence as a program and budget analyst with assignments on the Army staff, a major command, a defense agency, and at an overseas field site.

Following his time with the Army, Norquist served for six years with the House Appropriations Subcommittee on Defense as a professional staff member, where he focused on Air Force aircraft, munitions, ballistic missile defense and information assurance.

From 2002 to 2006, he served as a deputy undersecretary of defense in the Office of the Comptroller. In 2006, President George W. Bush selected him as the first Senate-confirmed Chief Financial Officer of the Department of Homeland Security.

Between his stints in government service, Norquist was a partner with Kearney and Company, a certified public accounting firm.

Norquist was born in Concord, MA. He is a 1989 graduate of the University of Michigan, where he received a BA in Political Science and a master's in Public Policy. He also holds an MA in National Security Studies from Georgetown University.



VICE ADM GUY ROBINSON, CB OBE

Chief of Staff of NATO Allied Command Transformation Royal Navy, North Atlantic Treaty Organization

Guy Robinson joined the Royal Navy in 1986 as a warfare officer. His

seagoing career has been primarily spent in frigates and destroyers, serving as a bridge watchkeeping officer, navigator and then Principal Warfare Officer. He has been fortunate to command three warships: the patrol vessel HMS GUERNSEY, the Type 42 Destroyer HMS EDINBURGH and the Type 45 Destroyer HMS DARING. In 2003, he commanded EDINBURGH during the combat phase of the 2nd Gulf War and was subsequently awarded a Mentionin-Despatches. In 2008 he operated from the Iraqi Khawr al Amaya offshore oil terminal as Commander Task Group 158.1, running operations in the Northern Arabian Gulf. In 2012, he took DARING on the first operational deployment of a Type 45 to the Middle East, From 2015 through 2016 he was the Deputy Commander of United Kingdom Maritime Forces, the Royal Navy's high readiness battle staff. During that assignment he assumed duties as

Commander of Combined Task Force 150, the counter-terrorism task force operating in the Indian Ocean. In his most recent command assignment (2017-21) he was Deputy Commander at Naval Striking and Support Forces NATO (STRIKFORNATO) based at Oeiras, Portugal; a deployable Joint battle staff whose primary role is the integration of high-end U.S. maritime capabilities into NATO operations.

During assignments ashore, Vice Admiral Robinson has served in the UK's Ministry of Defence (MoD), working as the financial programmer in the above water equipment capability area. He also served on the staff of Flag Officer Sea Training staff as Commander Sea Training where he was responsible for the training of all Royal Naval major warships, from frigates to aircraft carriers, as well as a multitude of ships from both NATO and non-NATO navies. As a captain he served in the MoD's Development, Concepts & Doctrine Centre (DCDC) where he was responsible for generating maritime concepts and high-level doctrine. His most recent

shore assignment (2013) has been in Navy Command Headquarters as the Assistant Chief of Staff (Warfare), where he was responsible for the assessment of the Fleet's warfighting capability. He became Chief of Staff at Headquarters Allied Command Transformation in July 2021.

When in the UK, Vice Admiral Robinson lives in Hampshire with his wife Mel, a Commodore in the Royal Navy, and their two adult children Max and Maisie. He is a graduate of the UK Higher Command and Staff Course (2013), the US Coalition Force Maritime Component Commanders' Course (2015), the Royal College of Defence Studies (2017) and is an alumnus of the Windsor Leadership Trust. He holds a master's degree in defence studies from King's College London. Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth appointed him as an Officer in the Military Division of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire in 2013. His Majesty The King appointed him as a Companion of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath in 2023.

DR. TIM GRAYSON

Special Assistant to the SecAF for Mission-Centered Analysis and Operational Imperatives U.S. Department of the Air Force

Dr. Timothy Grayson is Special Assistant to the Secretary of the Air Force with the

primary responsibility to coordinate concept development, analysis, and implementation of the Secretary's Operational Imperatives, the critical operational air and space capabilities needed to deter, and if necessary defeat, our pacing challenges.

Prior to this role, Dr. Grayson was the Director of the Strategic Technology Office (STO) at DARPA. He led the office in

Prior to CIA, Dr. Grayson was a program manager and senior scientist at DARPA and before that was a research fellow at Air Force Wright Laboratory (now part of Air Force Research Laboratory). Dr. Grayson holds a PhD in Physics from University of Rochester, where he specialized in quantum optics, and a BS in Physics from University of Dayton with minors in mathematics and computer science.


