#### **Summary / Key Takeaways:**

- DoD must act urgently to sustain and strengthen U.S. deterrence, with the People's Republic of China (PRC) as our "pacing challenge."
- Three ways to advance NDS priorities:
  - Integrated Deterrence, Campaigning, and Building Enduring Advantages
- Close collaboration with Allies and partners is foundational to U.S. national security interests and for our collective ability to address shared challenges.



#### **Building Enduring Advantages:**

 Building the future Joint Force requires broad and deep changes in how we produce and manage military capabilities; make the right technology investments; and adapt and fortify our Defense Ecosystem.

## **FDEC Mandate**

#### Serve as OSD Policy's lead for:

- Emerging capability policy and strategy development, including integration into planning and budgets;
- Emerging technology diplomacy efforts and USG interagency collaboration;
- Devising and facilitating the issuance of—and overseeing compliance by DoD Components of—force planning and programming guidance; and,
- Making recommendations to balance Joint Force capability, capacity, and readiness for DoD's primary defense missions and emerging security challenges.

FEDC is OSD Policy's link to Defense Components with strong equities in emerging technologies, capability development, and innovation.



## **FDEC Mission**

#### Work closely within OSD and across DoD components to:

- ✓ Identify and promote emerging capabilities that connect the 2022 *National Defense Strategy* to defense planning and the budget across different timeframes;
- ✓ Build ethical and responsible policies for DoD use of emerging technologies;
- ✓ Develop approaches at the intersection of strategic stability and emerging capabilities designed to reduce the risk of inadvertent conflict and arms races;
- ✓ Promote the development, deployment, and use of emerging capabilities with Allies and partners through Policy-led bilateral and multilateral engagement;
- ✓ Annually develop, coordinate, and gain Secretary approval and issuance of the DPG;
- Represent USD(P) interests in the annual PPBE cycle, including by recommending and securing resourcing adjustments in the President's Budget submission, through the PBR process;
- Conduct force planning assessments to identify strategic and operational risks to the NDS and to the programmed Joint Force, seeking concepts, capabilities, and other ways and means to manage/mitigate these risks, near- and long-term;
- ✓ Lead Department efforts on management of AUKUS Pillar I and Pillar II.



## **FDEC Current Priorities**

- Promote the responsible development and adoption of emerging capabilities that advance NDS objectives
  - Policy-lead on yearly Defense Planning Guidance
  - Through senior leader initiatives such as Replicator
- Serve as DoD policy lead in interagency forums on emerging capabilities (Al/ML, autonomy, biotech for military capabilities, others...)
  - DoD lead for Political Declaration on the Responsible Military Use of AI and Autonomy
  - Biotech-related threats to U.S. national security
  - Reduce barriers to fielding Directed Energy capabilities
- Identifying ways to work more closely with Allies and int'l partners
  - Lead overall management of AUKUS Pillar I and Pillar II efforts
