In 1993, he graduated from Louisiana State University and was subsequently commissioned through the Navy Reserve Officers' Training Corps program at Southern University. Lt Gen Linda Hurry, USAF

Deputy Commander, HQ AFMC

Lt. Gen. Linda S. Hurry is Deputy Commander, Air Force Materiel Command, Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Ohio. The command employs 89,000 people and manages \$72 billion of budget authority annually. She oversees activities across multiple centers, responsible for installation and mission support, discovery and development, test and evaluation, life cycle management services and sustainment of virtually every major Air Force weapon system, to include the entire scope of nuclear weapons sustainment.

As Deputy Commander, Lt. Gen. Hurry is responsible for the evolution of aerospace systems from conceptual phase through production and introduction into the operating inventory. Her duties include directing policy and procedures affecting AFMC aircraft logistics, product acquisition and sustainment, technology research and development, as well as system test and evaluation to meet known and anticipated operational requirements. She also manages worldwide logistics support to U.S. Air Force operating commands, as well as foreign, Security Assistance Program air forces.

Finally, she supports the commander by ensuring Air Force guidance for installation and mission support around the world.

Lt. Gen. Hurry graduated from the Air Force Academy, Colorado Springs, Colorado, in 1991 with a Bachelor of Science in Pre-law and Legal Studies. Prior to her current assignment, she served as the Director of Logistics, Deputy Chief of Staff for Logistics, Engineering and Force Protection, Headquarters U.S. Air Force, the Pentagon, Arlington, Virginia.



VADM Andy Kyte CB FCILT

Chief of Defence Logistics and Support (CDLS), UK Ministry of Defence

Vice Admiral Andy Kyte was appointed as the Chief of Defence Logistics and Support (CDLS)

with effect from September 2023. He is responsible for developing and overseeing the implementation of a cross-cutting, pan-Defence strategy for Support, a c. £16-billion/annum enterprise covering every facet of Logistics, Engineering and Equipment Support.

A career logistician, he has over 38 years' service, including operational tours in Northern Ireland, the Arabian Gulf and

Afghanistan. Previous appointments include Head of Defence Logistic Operations and Command of the High Readiness Joint Force Logistic HQ. In 2018 he was appointed as the 2* Assistant Chief of the Defence Staff (ACDS) (Support Operations) where he was responsible for the provision of strategic level policy, planning and direction in support of current and contingent operations. His tenure was dominated by the Support challenges created by BREXIT, COVID and the Russian invasion of Ukraine. Prior to assuming the post of CDLS he led a study for the Chief of the Defence Staff (CDS), focused on increasing Defence outputs.

Vice Admiral Andy Kyte is a graduate of the Higher Command and Staff Course and the London Business School. He holds an MA in Defence Studies and is a Fellow of the Chartered Institute of Logistics and Transport. He was appointed a Companion of the Bath in the 2020 New Year's Honours List for leadership of Defence's response to the COVID pandemic. He is the Chair of the Association of Royal Navy Officers, and its sister organisation, the Royal Navy Officers Charity.

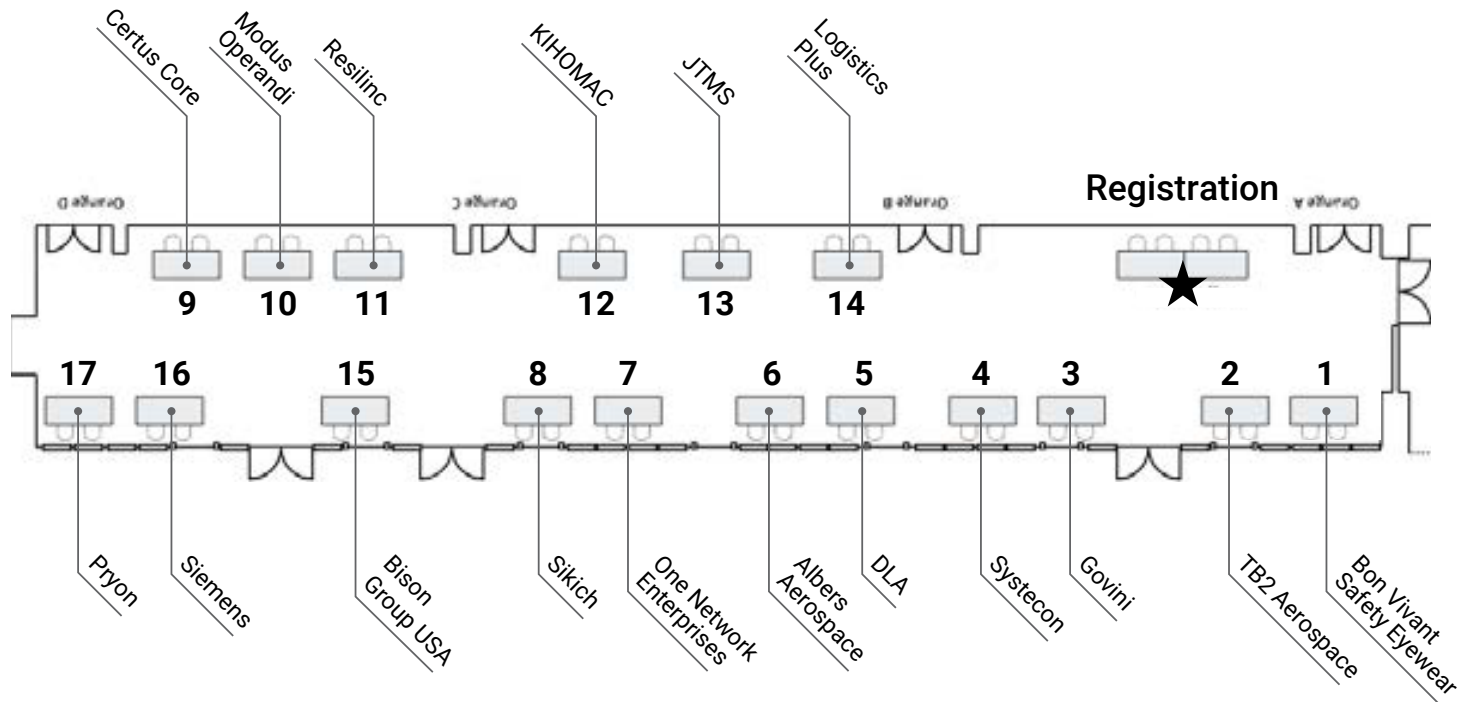

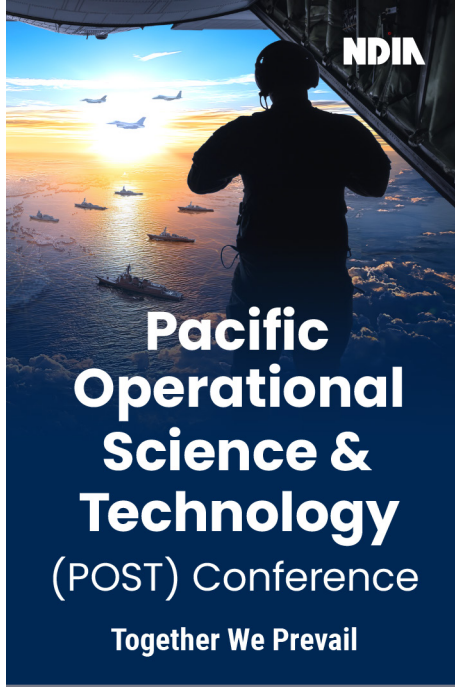
