SUPPORT TO U.S. NORTHERN COMMAND

Defense Support of Civil Authorities

DOD response forces are designed to put the right capabilities to support local and state authorities during disaster response.

DOD support civilian first responders only when requested by a state and approved by the Secretary of Defense.

Federal military forces are employed in the United States in compliance with U.S laws.

Theater Security Cooperation

The commander of USNORTHCOM is responsible for theater security cooperation with Canada, Mexico, and The Bahamas.

JTF-CS participates in multiple Theater Security Cooperation exercises a year.

Theater security cooperation is an essential part of strengthening continental defense and builds relationships essential for future cooperation.

Homeland Defense and Resilience

Each DSCA response demonstrates readiness, responsiveness, capability and resilience - delivering a visible deterrent effect.

Integrated planning identifies capabilities providing the greatest effect with the smallest number of forces - critical in a resource-constrained environment.

Specialized forces responding to a disaster enable DOD to focus on competing requirements.

CHALLENGES - EMERGING THREATS/ADVANCED TECHNOLOGIES


- Nation states greatly increases the complexity of any response
- Nuclear proliferation/threat planning since 9/11/2001 focused on a single, 10kT ground detonated device or multiple similar devices
- Novel chemical agents "Novichoks"
 - Binary agents
 - Persistency
- Novel biological agents and toxins
- Dual-use technologies
 - Bio, Chemical
 - Cyber
- Increasing/expanding delivery options
- "Secondary/tertiary threats"




CHALLENGES AND OPPORTUNITIES — MODERN DOMESTIC ENVIRONMENT

Challenges

- 1. Information Environment misinformation, disinformation, assumption
- Potential for homeland defense scenario –
 CBRN threats unlikely to occur in isolation
 - Nation-state actors
- Reduction in trained Title 10 responders DoD focus on warfighting
- 4. Congestion and unity of effort. Lots of people all trying to do the right thing (and some not)





Mitigations

- 1. Transparency
- 2. Preparation/readiness
- 3. JTF-CS "just in time" response concept
 - Technology
- 4. Aggressive coordination across response enterprise

INTO THE FUTURE

<u>Interagency & Whole of Government Response:</u> National and regional level exercises, strengthen interagency cooperation, relationships, close operational and planning gaps, and build redundancy.











<u>Future CRE:</u> The future of the Title 10 CBRN response enterprise (CRE) may look much different than the current force. JTF-CS, USNORTHCOM, and DoD writ large are all working to help shape the future of CBRN response in the homeland.

<u>FIFA and World Cup:</u> preparations and exercises will shape JTC-CS response capability in the coming years as we prepare to send specialized teams to 11 cities in 2026 and help coordinate Title 10 support to the events.

<u>Evolving Mission Requirements:</u> JTF-CS mission of immediate response to no-notice incidents within North America provides a unique capability – the JTF is NORTHCOM's only AOR-wide, immediately deployable intermediate HQ. We are prepared to provide C2 options for any mission that should require them.

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
